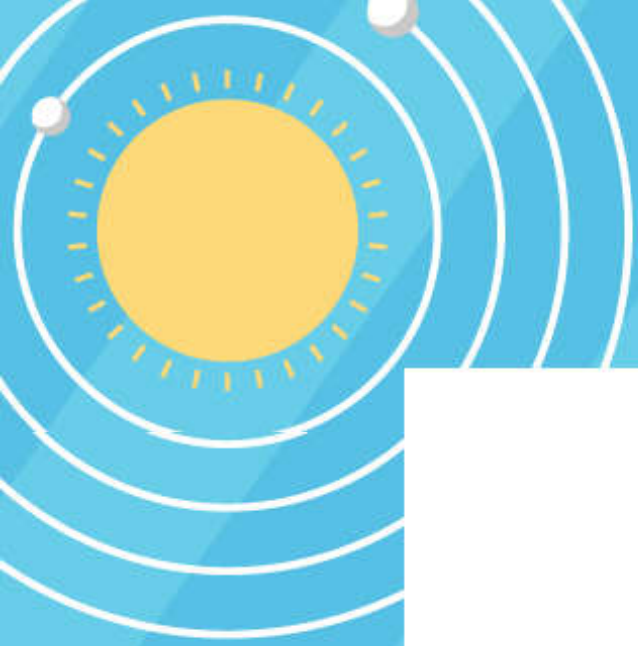

- dem (means people) => democracy (ประชาธิปไตย)
- auto (means self / same) => automobile (รถยนต์)
- equi (means equal) => equity (ความเสมอภาค / ความถูกต้อง / ความยุติธรรม)
- bio (means life) => biology (ชีววิทยา)
