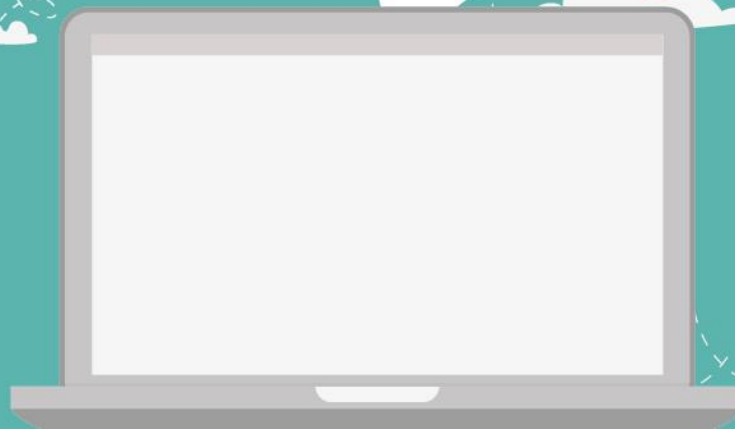

- A preposition used to refer to a place where something or someone is located
- There are three prepositions of place used to discuss several places
- Discussing important details for communication purposes

At - used to discuss a certain point

In - used to discuss an enclosed space

On - used to discuss a surface

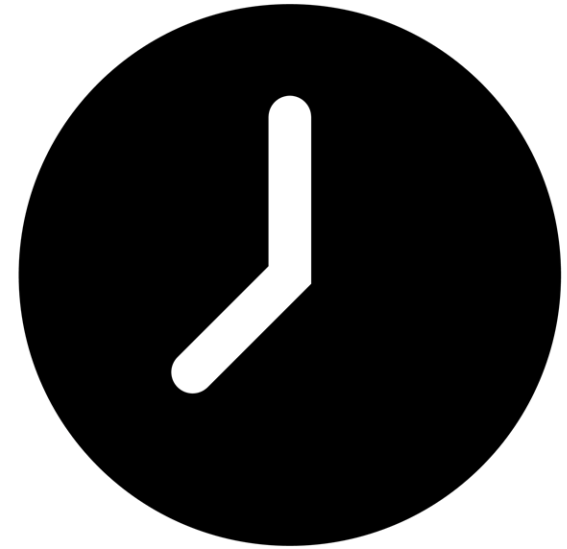

1.3 Preposition of Movement

- Movement from one place to another place
- Usually use with verbs of motion
- Also called prepositions of direction



At the Restaurant

1.3 Preposition of Movement

across

movement from one side to the other side of something.

“The dog ran across the road and nearly got hit by a car.”

around

movement passing something in a curved route, not going through it.

“They walked around the town for an hour.”

away from

indicating the point where a movement begins.

“The mouse ran away from the cat and escaped.”

At the Restaurant

1.3 Preposition of Movement

- down** movement from a higher point to a lower point of something.
“They ran down the hill to the stream below.”
- from** indicating the point where a movement begins.
“We flew from Bangkok to London.”
- into** movement to an enclosed space; movement resulting in physical contact.
“The car crashed into the wall.”

At the Restaurant

1.3 Preposition of Movement

off

movement away from (and often down from) something.

“Please take your papers off my desk.”

on to, onto

movement to the top surface of something.

“They went up on to the stage.”

out of

indicating the enclosed space where a movement begins.

“He went out of the room to smoke a cigarette.”

over

movement above and across the top or top surface of something.

“The cat jumped over the wall.”

1.3 Preposition of Movement

past

movement from one side to the other side of something.

“We gave the marathoners water as they ran past us.”

to

movement in the direction of something.

“Does this train go to London?”

through, thru

movement in one side and out of the other side of something

“The train goes through a tunnel under the hill.”

1.3 Preposition of Movement

towards,

movement in the direction of something.

toward

“The night sky got brighter as they drove toward the city.”

under

movement directly below something.

“The mouse ran under the chair.”

up

movement from a lower point to a higher point of something.

“Jack and Jill ran up the hill.”

3.1 Arrive at the restaurant



- “Could you tell me where the restroom is?”
- “Can I see a menu, please?”
- “Could we see the menu, please?”
- “Could we see the drinks menu, please?”
- “Could I have a menu, please?”
- “What would you recommend?”
- “What's today's special?”

At the Restaurant

3.1 Arrive at the restaurant



- "Could you tell me where the restroom is?"
- "We're not ready to order yet. Could you give us a few more minutes, please?"
- "We're ready to order now."
- "We would like to order now, please."

At the Restaurant

3.2 Order food



- "Could I have.....?"
- "I would like....."
- "I would like a glass of water, please."
- "Could we have a jug of water, please?"

At the Restaurant

3.2 Order food



- "I'd like my steak rare/ medium/well done."
- "Are there any peanuts? My child has allergies."
- "Do you have any vegetarian dishes?"
- "Is this dish suitable for vegetarians?"
- "Is this dish suitable for vegans?"
- "Is this dish halal?"
- "Is this dish kosher?"
- "Does this dish contain nuts?"

3.2 Order Food (Waiter's Recommendation)



- “Can I get you anything else?”
- “I'd recommend the lasagna/steak/ pizza.”
- “Would you care for an appetizer/a beer/a cocktail?”
- “I'd like to have a beer/steak/glass of wine.”
- “Here you are.”
- “The spaghetti/steak/chicken looks good.”
- “How is the pizza/fish/beer?”
- “Would you like...”
- “Enjoy your meal!”

3.2 Order food



- “That sounds good. I'll have that.”
- “I'd like a coke.”
- “The spaghetti looks really good.”
- “No, lasagna is more than enough for me!”

At the Restaurant

3.2 Order food (Again)



- "Same again, please"
- "Could I have another glass (or bottle) of _ please?"
(say what you are drinking)
- "Could you bring me another____ please?"
(say what you are drinking)

At the Restaurant

3.3 Finish the Meal/ Pay for the Meal



- "That was delicious! Thank you."
- "That was lovely! Thank you."
- "Everything was great."
- "Could we have the bill, please?"
- "Can I pay by credit card?"
- "Keep the change." (if you pay by cash, and want to leave a tip)

3.4 Possible Problems



- "Excuse me - I didn't order this."
- "I'm sorry - I think this may be someone else's meal."
- "Could I have another spoon (or other piece of cutlery), please?"
- "Could you heat this up a bit more for me, please?"

3.4 Possible Problems



- "Could you check the bill for me, please? It doesn't seem right."
- "I think you may have made a mistake with the bill."
- "I'd like the check, please."

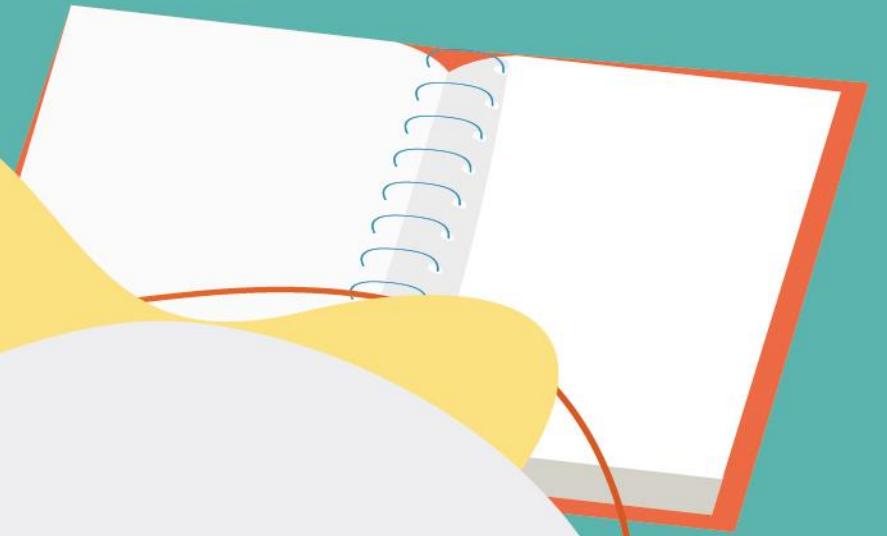
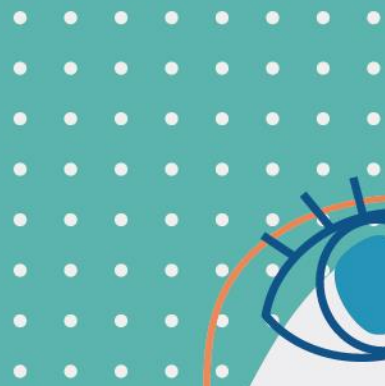

4. Other Manners at the Restaurant

Dining out in restaurants in the UK is a formal situation, where politeness is expected if you want good service. It is important to say please and thank you to the staff who look after you and serve you with your meal, or you will be considered rude. Restaurant staff in the UK tend to be friendly and chatty, but they normally interact with customers in a formal way, and will probably call you sir or madam. If you order a bottle of wine, you will be invited to taste it first, before it is poured for everyone else at your table to drink. In the UK, it is customary to leave a tip of around 10-15% of the bill, for good service and food.
